Section B

Structure, governance and management

Type of governing document

The Scout Group has a Governance Document, reviewed annually.

How the charity is constituted

The groups governing documents are those of The Scout Association. They consist of the Royal Charter which in turn gives authority to the Bye Laws of the association and The Policy Organisation and Rules (POR) of The Scout Association.

The group is a trust established under the Association which are common to all Scout Groups. The Trustees are appointed in accordance with the POR of The Scout Association.

The group is managed by the Group Executive Committee, the members of which are the "Charity Trustees" of the Scout Group – which is an educational charity. As charity trustees they are responsible for complying with legislation applicable to charities.

Trustee selection methods

The group trustees are elected annually at the Group AGM.

Additional governance issues

The Group Executive Committee exists to support the Group Scout Leader in meeting the responsibilities of their appointment and is responsible for:

The maintenance of Group Property. The raising of funds and the administration of Group finances. The insurance of persons, property and equipment. Coordination of Group public occasions. Assisting in the recruitment of Leaders and other adult support. Appointing any sub-committees that may be required. Appointing Group Administrators and Advisors other than those elected.

The Group Executive Committee are responsible for all matters involved in running the Group including its dissolution if voted on by the membership at an AGM or Special Meeting. The Chairman and GSL will prepare a report for the meeting outlining how assets are to be distributed based on the principle of their continued use for the purpose that they were originally obtained.

The Group Scout Leader is responsible for the appointment of volunteers into roles within the group. Helpers can be appointed and then trained into roles as assistant leaders or leaders. The GSL ensures appropriate training and checks are carried out and is responsible for control of volunteers.

Collectively and individually they must:

- Use reasonable care and skill in their work as trustees.
- Use their personal skills and experience in their work as trustees.
- Obtain external professional, specialist advice when needed.
- Act honestly and reasonably in the interests of the charity at all times.
- Use charitable funds only in the furtherance of the charity's objectives.
- Safeguard the charity's finances ensuring that the charity is and will remain solvent, and avoid undue risks.
- Ensure that the charity complies with charity law and the requirements of the appropriate charity regulator.
- Ensure that the charity follows the rules set out in its governing document (Policy, Organisation and Rules).
- Act with integrity and avoid any personal conflicts of interest or misuse of charity funds or assets.

Objectives

AGM Report 2018 - 2019

Summer Term 2018

We had 9 Beavers taking part in the carnival parade dressed as 'surfer's against sewerage' a group of parents came up with the idea and took on organising the props for the parade. Each Beaver taking part dressed their surfer look by adding a necklace or sash made out of bits of plastic. The shorter route suited the Beavers better, they all looked very original and we came 3rd in the U11 category.

Autumn Term 2018

The first couple of weeks back we made the most of the lighter nights with a walk along the mineral line, an evening boating and a night hike.

Several Beavers completed their Book Readers badge after completing the summer reading challenge put on by local libraries and most earned their Animal Friends badge which was partly covered on a Colony evening but involves looking after an animal at home for four weeks.

We had a joint sleepover with the Cubs at Bishops Lydeard early in October with 14 Beavers. It was supposed to be an outdoor camp but after all the lovely weather in September the weather broke on the Friday with heavy rain, wind and a drop in temperature so the decision was taken to hold it indoors. The weather did improve on the Sunday so a lot of the activities were done outside. The Beavers and Cubs were mixed into groups and both sections worked well together made new friendships and gained a lot from the weekend. The theme was 70 years of Scouting at Watchet with crafts activities including decorating T-shirts and tiles and also camp craft activities. At the end of camp Hamish Johnson moved up to Cubs and we enrolled his brother Max.

We had a 100% turnout of for the remembrance parade and service in Watchet which was excellent.

We again made decorations for our entry to St Decuman's christmas tree festival the theme was pantomime and we did the Snow Queen. They also made advent wreaths.

17 Beavers attended the annual Group Carol and Christingle Service at the Methodist Church where most took part with the Beaver reading.

Spring Term 2019

The Spring term had various themes,

Light - making Chinese lanterns and lighting candles.

Garden birds - to coincide with the big garden bird watch.

Chinese New Year - including tasting Chinese food

Team building - challenges and activities and learning about Beavers and Scouting in Lithuania.

Chocolate - learning about fair trade and tasting and voting on their favourite type of chocolate.

Pancake - we talked about how pancake day was celebrated in other countries, they designed both a healthy pancake and a not so healthy pancake we had a pancake relay and finished the evening eating pancakes.

Water - with building rafts out of recyclable materials, making water filters and in lodges they had to design a water wall (getting the water to flow from the top to a bucket at the bottom) from various recyclable materials which had been brought in. It was interesting to see how the lodges worked (or not!) together. All the water walls worked and they enjoyed the evening.

Easter - included making mini egg rocky road, decorating Easter biscuits and of course an Easter egg hunt!

The activities covered parts of the Challenge Awards and International badge.

Summer Term 2019

There was no St George's Day Parade at Dunster this year so the Cubs Leaders organised a service and Parade at the Methodist Church as St George's Day fell on a Cub night and invited the other sections along as well, we had a very good turn for the evening.

We also had a very good turn out for the RN Admiralty Inspection.

With the lighter nights we again tried to get out and about a bit so have had an evening walk along the mineral line collecting natural materials for making a mask. An evening on West Street beach where they explored and cooked hot dogs over a camp fire. A hike on Staple Plain using a simple map to navigate we were lucky with a dry evening and we saw plenty of deer. Indoor evenings have included map work for their Navigators badge and first aid for Emergency Aid badge; various experiments with volcanoes for the Experiment badge.

Beavers have also been collecting used stamps which will be given to Elliots Touch, we have a collecting tub is in the HQ and we invite the other section to collect stamps and bring them in also.

General

We maintain the Colony at 18 Beavers and we have a number on the waiting list who are 6+. Over the year we have enrolled 16 Beavers. Five Beavers have moved up to Cubs and we have awarded three Bronze Awards. A total of 248 badges have been awarded to Beavers over the year!

This will be my last report as Beaver Scout Leader as after 17 years I am stepping down at the end of this term. Judi who stepped in a few years ago to help me when we were struggling for leaders is also stepping down at the same time. We are fortunate that there remains a strong team to replace us with Lina Jokubaviciute taking over the role as Beaver Scout Leader with Kaitlyn Plumbley as Assistant Beaver Leader and Oli Greenway as our Young Leader, although parent help either occasionally or regularly is always welcome!

My sincere thanks to all the Leaders, Young Leaders and boating helpers who have helped with Beavers over the past year without the extra help we would not be able to offer the varied programme and trips we offer to our Beavers.

Scout Leaders Report July 2018 - July 2019


Since the last AGM in July 2018 the troop has been very busy with lots of varied activities.

August saw the scouts visit the island of Flatholm in the Bristol Channel, which was one of the very first camps for many of our new scouts and a fantastic place to start their scouts experience. Travelling out by Rigid Inflatable Boats from Penarth the scouts arrived on a Friday morning with their overnight kit including lightweight tents and trangia stoves and military ration packs.

Having been met by the island warden and given an initial safety brief the scouts set up their tents next to the isolated farm house on the island, before being given a guided tour of the island by the warden, looking at the natural features as well as the varied historical ruins from over the years including 18th century canons and fabrications from the second world war.

They had a fantastic afternoon then exploring and playing some games before settling down for their evening meal, before a visit to the museum on the island and an evenings camp fire before supper.

The Saturday morning saw the Scouts up early, cooking their breakfast before striking camp and packing their equipment before the return boat trip over to Penarth, where at lunchtime they had a McDonalds before the return journey home.



The Summer holidays saw the troop continue with many activities on the water at Watchet with sailing, kayaking canoeing pulling and power boating with a start back to term time activities with a visit to the Dorset Water Park at Corfe Castle where they had a great afternoon on the inflatable obstacle courses getting wet . Several new scouts were invested into the troop before heading over to Swanage for their evening meal.



Autumn activities including many inside the HQ including radio communications, map and compass work as well as cooking. Another weekend away was held with the scouts visiting the historic dockyards in Portsmouth including HMS Victory and HMS Warrior, staying at Gosport Sea Scouts HQ and visiting the submarine museum.

An autumn camp was held at parsonage farm which included fire lighting and patrol cooking with a visit to the Laser Quest zone at Cannington to built their team work, This was an excellent activity giving many scouts an experience of leadership and strategy.

Several visits to the Swimming pool at Blue Anchor were arranged where kayaking practise and lifejacket drills were performed.

The boating season ended with a raft race after the scouts had constructed them, and tried to race them around a course in the harbour, Some of the scouts need to practise their knots and lashings.

The Remembrance Day Parade was well supported with a fantastic effort by the scouts paying their respects to the fallen.

Over several weeks the scouts undertook their first aid awards, where they were able to enhance existing skills as well as start for the new scouts. During this time the scouts continued with nautical skills including a visit to the Lifeboat Station at Minehead where they practised their knots and boating knowledge during a walk around various bases hosted by the crew.



The group carol service was well supported as was the fund raising at Tesco's with our annual trolley pushing.

January the scouts developed their map reading skills ahead of a weekend on Dartmoor in February where two nights were spent in a bunk house near Princetown on the moor itself. A great day was spent navigating the moor in freezing conditions, with even snow on the Sunday before the group left for the Royal Navy base at Devonport and a planned visit to a submarine as well as a surface ship, HMS Northumberland, a type 23 frigate,

The scouts were welcomed warmly by the RN personnel who spent a great deal of time showing them around the two ships and answering many questions.

Following this weekend the scouts were the guests of the Police public order training team at Clevedon where they learnt about riot tactics including learning to use shields and make cordons for public order control, a fun evening was had by everyone including the leaders, especially Gary!



With Spring soon approaching the scouts joined the explorers for some practise cycle rides ahead of the Jersey Expedition. Evenings spent learning about cycle maintenance, tyre changing and puncture repairs were all undertaken, with practise cycle rides along the steam coast trail to Blue Anchor and then onwards to Minehead where they had a well-deserved lunch at McDonalds.

Another overnight camp was held at Parsonage Farm further developing their cooking skills and as part of a camping permit assessment for the leaders with another visit to the Laser Quest zone in Cannington.

A visit to the Royal Navy Air Station at Yeovilton was a favourite activity hosted by the commando helicopter force. An opportunity to see the historic flight, visit the fire station as well as the helicopter hangers and a change to get inside a Merlin Helicopter. The officer who was our liaison gave the scouts and explorers an enthusiastic speech explaining his career, leaving school with no qualifications but just his scouting skills which led him into the Royal Navy and as a Venture Scout continued in scouting until he received his commission, all the skills he had learnt in scouts helping him. At the end of the visit the scouts had their photo taken in front of the gate guard aircraft a Wessex Helicopter. We look forward to our return visit which has been offered to the commando helicopter force training ground.

April saw the scouts visit Jersey for this years main expedition with the Explorers, where a mix of activities were undertaken, from camping and small overnight expeditions, to kayaking, rafting, blow carting, climbing, archery, and the cycling which took the scouts all over the island, visiting various famous locations. The scouts were able to join in with the local sea scouts and make friends and undertake activities together, learning new skills. The week was a fantastic success and one that we owe so much to all the adults that made it a success. Thank you . you know who you all are..



The St Georges Day Parade this year was held in Watchet on the Tuesday evening due to the clash of dates for easter Sunday this year. The short parade and service was well supported by the scouts who again looked so smart.

The boating season began following the Jersey Expedition and so far this year has included many sailing, kayaking and power boating sessions on Fridays and weekends.

Some of our leaders and one scout attended the National Queens Scouts St Georges Day Parade at Windsor Castle where assistant Scout Leader Jake Ellis was parading carrying the association standard in the colour party, in front of all the new Queen Scouts Awards recipients. A fantastic honour and Jake did us all proud.



The bi annual Royal Navy Inspection of the Scout Group was undertaken at the end of April with our inspecting officer Lieutenant Viv Joynes from the Royal Navy joining us for a colours ceremony before inspecting the scouts and other group members before she observed the scouts undertake a mix of activities on the water including kayaking, pulling, power boating and dinghy sailing. The evening was a great success with the county scout commissioner Liz Henderson joining us for some presentation of scout awards and the investing of 3 of our new scouts. The inspecting officer also named our new safety boat in memory of our Assistant Scout Leader Karen Smyth whilst her son James and her mum were present.



The following week saw us inspected again this time by the Royal Yachting Association to confirm our activity centre and instructors met the required standards to deliver the courses that we do. This again was a great example of how good our scouts and instructors are and resulted in another pass and recognition from the RYA.

The Scouts took part in the fund raising for the Dorset and Somerset Air Ambulance collecting in buckets during the coast to coast cycle ride which starts in Watchet and finishes at West Bay in Dorset. They all did a fantastic job and their help was very much appreciated.



3 x car washes were completed recently to help fund the recent servicing on the scout minibuses which needed work. Those scouts that helped were again hard working, polite and a credit to themselves and the scout group. Many visitors commented on their excellent behaviour and keenness to assist and their effort to get out and raise funds.

Not many other youngsters do.

An evening was spent Dragon Boating down on the River Exe in Exeter where two dragon boats were hired and some of the scouts were able to complete their third go at dragon boating qualifying them for their Dragon boating award, before another Mc Donalds Supper.



A camp of a different kind was arranged in June with the scouts staying at the Flip Out Trampoline Centre where they had a bounce, then an evening meal, a film, and then slept on the trampolines overnight, before having a further bouncing session, and then breakfast. Following this the scouts proceeded down to bristol floating harbour where canoes and a pulling gig were launched and the

scouts were able to paddle and pull along Bristols iconic Water Front and in front of the Historic SS Great Britain. A fantastic weekend in very warm weather!



Last weekend the older Scouts were hosted again by the Royal Navy down at HMS Excellent in Portsmouth where they stayed on board the Type 82 Destroyer HMS Bristol before spending two days on the water power boating and dinghy sailing, with a day sail to Port Solent, an evening spent ten pin bowling, and eating plenty of food cooked by the RN and no washing up ! This was a very hot Saturday and then a very wet but warm Sunday. A great weekend again.



Overall this last year the scouts have had the opportunity to get afloat on over 50 different occasions and complete over 25 nights away. A very varied and exciting programme which will continue into the next scouting year, with planned the RN Football Gala, Swimming Gala, Studland Dorset Expedition in 2020 and in 2021 a return cycle expedition along the Normandy Coast and Beaches in France.

The scout leaders would like to thank everyone for their support and the scouts for their attendance at activities and their determination and behaviour. They are a pleasure to take away and lead on activities.

1st Watchet Mariners Explorer Scout Unit (RN63) Leaders Annual Report 2018-2019



This year our Explorers have been really busy again. We've currently got 17 Explorers ranging from 14 - 17 years in age. We started off the year with quite a lot of boating. Our Explorers have excelled at Dinghy Sailing, Kayaking and Canadian Canoeing in addition to developing their Power Boating Skills.

During the summer holidays a few of our Explorers light weight camped on Flat Holm, travelling over by Power Boat from Barry Docks.





At the end of the summer holidays we visited the Dorset Water Park again which has become a firm favourite. We are looking to incorporate this again into another camp in September.



Over the last year we have focused heavily on hiking and navigation. We started off with a night hike and camp from Minehead back to Warren Farm, before heading up onto the Quantocks and then in February heading off onto Dartmoor, stopping at the Whiteworks Bunkhouse. Two of our Explorers also completed the Ten Tors challenge this year on Dartmoor, which was a phenomenal achievement.





As expected, the Royal Navy has featured heavily in our programme too. We started off with a weekend visit to Portsmouth Historic Dockyard in October. We then spent a day at Devonport Dockyard in February with a tour around Churchill Class Submarine HMS Courageous, before spending the afternoon on HMS Northumberland. A few weeks later we visited the Commando Helicopter Force at RNAS Yeovilton. After passing our routine Royal Naval Inspection, we have also just come back from a great weekend sailing and power boating at HMS Excellent in Portsmouth, staying aboard HMS Bristol.



Over the past year we have also studied a lot of first aid, culminating in many of our Explorers attaining their RYA First Aid Certificate, which is a fantastic achievement, a great advertisement to future employers and also an enormous benefit to our community.
