Objectives and activities

The charity's objects

For the benefit of the elderly living in the area of benefit to relieve poverty, sickness or distress and provide or assist in the provision of facilities for general welfare, recreation and leisure time activities with the object of improving the condition of life of the said persons. The area of benefit shall be within East Leeds.

The charity's main activities

HOPE enables and supports older people in the Halton Moor, Osmondthorpe and Sutton Park areas of Leeds to retain their independence by providing practical help, advice and support. We work to address the isolation, poverty, fear of crime and poor health which impact negatively on their lives. We provide outreach, advocacy, medical appointment support and group sessions to relieve isolation and loneliness.

Public benefit statement

In setting our objectives and planning our activities our trustees have given serious consideration to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit.

Achievements and performance

This is my final year in post as chair of HOPE. I have enjoyed the role over the last three years immensely and seen at first hand the incredible work HOPE does for people 60 plus in the local community. I have seen the difference social interaction makes to the lives of so many people and the networks that have developed due to the services HOPE provides. I will, however, stand for re-election as a member of the trustee board as I am passionate about the project and feel it is of vital importance that local people, direct HOPE and keep this project at the heat of the local community.

I am immensely proud of staff, trustees and volunteers who work together as the united front of HOPE to deliver high quality, user led services.

Financial review

Net expenditure for the year was £2,126, all relating to unrestricted funds.

Reserves policy

The charity's free cash reserves at the year end were nil.

HOPE Trustees would like to note the difficult financial year 2018 – 2019. The year was difficult for two main reasons, staff levels reduced to one paid member of staff. This impacted on the time normally allocated to fundraising.

In addition, we were coming to the end of an eight-year contract with Leeds City Council - Adult Social Care. However, HOPE was successful in its tender and on the 1 October 2018, HOPE started its new five-year grant, this new grant had a significant uplift. In addition, HOPE was allocated additional funding from the Clinical Commission Group over a five-year period. As difficult as things have been, HOPE is now moving forward on a much more financially solid basis.
