CHAIR'S STATEMENT, SUMMARY AND THANKS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2019

I'd like to celebrate here another fruitful and successful year for Town Team projects in and around Broadstairs and St.Peter's.

Without the dedicated donation of time, skills and effort of our Trustees, Town Team would not be as successful and well respected as it is throughout Thanet, and for that I am very thankful and grateful to you all. We should all be very proud of what we have achieved this year, and also enabled and facilitated other local groups to do through our support too.

So here are some specific achievements we need to remind ourselves of, not just as a pat on the back, but also as inspiration to carry on through 2020 and beyond.

Our Gardens teams go from strength to strength and still maintain 5+ sites in and around Broadstairs. Lots of new members this year and a trend of smaller sub groups looking out for 'their patch' is a very good, social and workable model. Sue Wall and 'Scottish' Sue' have done a great double hander in organising and leading the general gardens groups.

Denise and her small but dedicated bunch have continued to ensure that the station greets us and our visitors with a wonderful display that takes many, many watering sessions in high season. Special mention for Alex, who supports Denise in her work often picking up the slack when other commitments and issues have meant that the station might have had to take a back seat, so our thanks to him.

The complete transformation of the long-neglected 'Lavender Bank' by the station was a huge achievement throughout 2019, and had taken 2 years of lengthy and tricky negotiation with Town Council, South Eastern and Network Rail. It was also a tough installation, but is now a source of immense pride for all of us.

The tiny 'Library Bank' team continued to make the crucial entrance route into the town a sight to behold. Countless donations of plants, help from a group of volunteers from Kent County Council Finance Department helped train and now a range of hardy perennials and Shrubs adorn the tricky steep bank. Mike was awarded the accolade of 'Kent Volunteer' of the Year' in 2019, and the group was awarded the Mayoress Cup by Town Council for their astonishing achievement.

Our litterpicks pick up a pace as usual in low season, although there were some during the summer including one done in conjunction with 2 other organisations, Cuddle Earth and Mindful Chef. Our equipment was loaned to many, many other local community groups to do their own litterpick and I would like to thank Wendy for maintaining the kit, and always being willing to liaise with a constant demand to borrow our equipment. We have supported with equipment loan, advice and guidance a new litterpicking group that has formed to take custodianship over Botany Bay and the surrounding areas.

The Harbour and Seafront Group continued their good work refurbishing the Old Look Out. Their ambition to be able to manage the maintenance on a more formal basis is now a distinct possibility as the building was added to the Thanet District Council asset disposal register in 2018. In order for this to happen, we decided it was time to form a new, independent CIC with a separate Board of Trustees in late 2018, which would then be able to submit a bid for the building to ensure it's sustainability and further development for the continued use by multiple groups in our community. We were delighted to support them in putting together all the stats and supporting documents in that bid, and news of the outcome is expected by the end of the year

Our RRR initiative from 2018 - (Reuse, recycle and reduce waste) which Town Team facilitated for many other groups, individuals and businesses locally is now in place in over 30 local businesses. Residents and visitors can now obtain free water refills, and they now form part of the Refill.org National register too.

Broadstairs Town Shed. Our longed for lift to provide complete accessibility for all members and visitors was finally installed this year. It has made an enormous difference to be able to offer everyone accessibility to our 1st floor facilities including our new craft, art and activity room. We now have over 120 + members, and an age range of 50 - 92, the average age is 72, and we are held up by The UK Men's Shed Association as an example of best practice for 'Men's Sheds' in the UK.

CHAIR'S STATEMENT, SUMMARY AND THANKS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2019

Our local community and supporters from local businesses are very generous with their support for the Shed. A Gala fund raising dinner this year was followed up by a wonderful Casino and Fund raising Gala dinner and auction in June 2019. This was specifically to kick off our campaign to 'Raise the roof' for the Shed. Our building dates back to 1910 and the roof is in very bad condition and potentially poses a future hazard for our day-to-day activity. Our benefactor, Willow Winston, lets us share her space for nominal rent, and therefore we are working together to raise money to replace the roof.

We have recently carried out a strategic review of Shed funding for 2019-21 and beyond to ensure its sustainability, growth and development to support the change in demands and needs but also to ensure that our core aims remain the same!. We are delighted that through the hard work of all the Shed heads and Shedders making things, ever-increasing numbers of new members paying subs, commissions for individuals and other local community groups plus other fund raising activities, and a couple of very generous donations from private Trusts, we have managed to accrue reserves that take the pressure off our need to raise funds for running costs to the end of 2020.

Town Team have continued in their love of supporting other local community groups with advice, materials, skills and guidance throughout 2018-19. Signposting with small, sometimes recently formed but also long established local groups to possible funding streams, supporting them with financial planning and bids, sharing our experiences in working with multiple stakeholders is an essential part of why and what we do to support our community as volunteers. A new project with Historic England and the Broadstairs Society will see us help to map areas of 'High townscape value', along with 10 or so volunteers from other groups, to inform elements of the new Local Plan.

Our 'Heritage' project started in conjunction with The Broadstairs Society in 2018, to try and establish a wide ranging Heritage facility for Broadstairs has developed to the point where a new CIC has been formed: 'The Broadstairs and St. Peter's Heritage Foundation'. It has an independent Board of Trustees and is now in discussion with Historic England, The Town Council, Greenwich University, local schools and colleges and countless local collectors and historical enthusiasts to bring the project to life over the coming 2-3 years.

Without you, my fellow Trustees, none of this would happen. Karen, you are my numbers rock and voice of reason about so many things that we face. Pip, you make light work of minute and Project reports, and nag us very subtly when we need to do stuff. Denise, I always know you have my back and support me so brilliantly as Vice Chair. All of you contribute in ways that will always make me so proud of what we achieve together for our town.

We are collectively amazing, we DO make a difference, and we come together, rarely have a cross word, discuss, debate and bring our individual perspectives to any issues we have to deal with as a Board. I am prouder than proud to work with you all. We are the envy of many other groups and that is because we are a very special group of people that 'get it'.

Thank you from the bottom of my heart and Thank You from everyone in Broadstairs and St. Peter's and beyond that tell me constantly how much they value what we all do for the town and our community.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2019

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2019. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The objectives of the charity as stated in our governing document are:

- To promote for the benefit of the inhabitants of the town of Broadstairs and St Peters to advance education and to provide facilities in the interests of social welfare for recreation and leisure-time occupation with the object of improving their conditions of life;

- To promote for the inhabitants of Broadstairs and St Peters the advancement of citizenship and community development through the promotion of volunteering, community engagement and civic responsibility, by improving the social and community infrastructure of underused recreational and public areas, including our town, parks and beaches.

To achieve these objectives our aims are to:

- instigate, participate in, execute and promote volunteer-led projects for the benefit of the inhabitants of and visitors to Broadstairs and St Peters and to enhance our key features, buildings and High Street;

- work with other community groups and the local authorities on relevant projects where our knowledge, expertise, skills, enthusiasm and volunteer force can add weight and delivery.

We are a group of volunteers who choose to work together for the good of our town. We have come together to do positive things, where we can see ways we can help, to make our town even better than we already know it is. When planning our activities, the trustees have considered the Charities Commission's guidance on public benefit, including the guidance 'public benefit: running a charity (PB2)'.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2019

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Significant activities and achievements

We endeavour to encourage all within our community to take part in our activities. We have a number of projects:

LITTERPICKS

We love to Brush Up Broadstairs with regular volunteer painting and litter picking events. It is always great fun and so satisfying to see the difference we can make if we pull together for the good of the town. Litter picks and other 'tidying up' activities are promoted on our Facebook page and anyone is encouraged to attend.

GARDENING GROUP

Our Gardening Group take care of five public garden sites around the town that were once unloved. This group of volunteers meet regularly and make out town such a nicer place.

BROADSTAIRS TOWN SHED

The Broadstairs Town Shed is aimed primarily at older men, a group traditionally under represented in community and social activities. Loneliness, isolation and depression are high risk factors for this group. Thanet is the most deprived district in Kent and Broadstairs has the highest number of over 65s in the county, so the project fulfils a particularly significant role within the county.

The Broadstairs Town Shed offers older people the opportunity to take part in regular woodworking sessions and offers a space for skills to be shared and learnt, friendships to be made and projects completed. We have 2 part time staff - a co-ordinator and an administrator.

We are undertaking new inductions every month and welcoming new 'Shedders'. Shedders pay membership fees to contribute to the running costs of the Shed. We also raise money by selling products and working in the community. Supporters of the Shed donate as part of the Friends of the Shed Scheme. This income we raise ourselves is not sufficient to cover the running of the Shed and we needed a lot of support this year to complete the refurbishment of the Big Shed as well. This year we gratefully received support from The Robert McAlpine Foundation, Tesco Bags, Kent Community Foundation, Southern Water and donations from the public. Raising money each year to keep the Shed going is our biggest challenge.

Comments from our members have shown that this project has given a purpose back in life to some lonely people. The Shed has become an important part of our community.

SHED LIFT

The lift was installed at the Shed this year. The Shed is in a building over two floors and many of our Shedders are elderly and have difficulty going up the stairs to the communal social areas of the Shed.

HARBOUR AND SEAFRONT GROUP

This group is focusing on improving our harbour and seafront. They have continued with their work to restore The Old Lookout. The group have now formed a separate charity to oversee the potential Community Asset transfer of The Old Lookout from TDC. The balance of funds held will be transferred to this new charity.

REUSE RECYCLE AND REDUCE WASTE

This project was to create a forum for all in our community to work together to produce initiatives in our town to help with the war against plastic. The Town Team funded a 'refill here' campaign and over 30 businesses have signed up to the scheme.

THE STATION CREW

The station is the first view many of our visitors have of our town and our aim is to make it welcoming and to provide information about our town so that they get the most out of their visit. We are working with Southeastern Trains and Network Rail to spruce up our station. During this year we replaced the large overgrown lavender bank outside the station. This is in conjunction with SouthEastern and Broadstairs and St Peter's Town Council and a new volunteer team has been formed.

THANET HUT WATCH

We have supported the users of our beaches by producing signage about safety and security of the beach huts leading our beaches to be safer places, less vulnerable to vandalism.

HERITAGE AND ARCHIVE PROJECT

A new initiative in conjunction with three other local community organisations. The formation of a permanent, comprehensive archive of printed material and ephemera, covering multiple aspects of Broadstairs history, along with an oral history element. A new charity is being formed to take this project on.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2019

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

Broadstairs Town Team Limited was incorporated on 9 July 2014. The company is limited by guarantee and was established under a Memorandum of Association and is governed under its Articles of Association as amended on 14 July 2015.

The company was registered as a charity on 11 September 2015. The company was dormant until 1 October 2015, when the activities and funds of the Broadstairs Town Team community group were transferred to the charity.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purposes of charity law. Trustees are subject to a rolling three yearly appointment and the chair is appointed by the trustees. New trustees are appointed at the AGM. All trustees give their time voluntarily and receive no benefits from the charity.

Induction and training of new trustees

New trustees are already familiar with the practical work of the charity having already become involved in existing projects. They are briefed on their legal obligations under charity and company law, the Charity Commission guidance on public benefit and the content of the Memorandum of Articles and Association.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The results for the year show a deficit of £6,894 on unrestricted funds (2018: deficit £1,393), leaving a balance on the fund at the end of the year of £10,845.

Broadstairs Town Shed is a restricted fund and has its own column in our accounts as it is our largest project. During the year we made a surplus of £17,114, leaving a balance on the fund of £55,191.

During the year the Shed raised £4,862 (2018: £4,283) from product sales and community work, £8,547 (2018: £7,173) from membership fees and £180 (2018: £180) from Friends of the Shed. These sources of income are all self generating and we have achieved a significant improvement over the previous year. However, The Shed is still dependent upon donations and grants of which we received £11,960 during the year.

The total costs for the running of the Shed were £33,114.

Our other restricted projects show a deficit of £3,944, leaving a balance on the fund at the end of the year of £22,096. This mainly relates to the Shed Lift Fund which will reduce as the lift is depreciated.

RESERVES

The charity aims to keep reserves sufficient to cover three months running costs. Where funds are received in advance of being spent the trustees plan to invest the funds in an interest bearing account.

This report has been prepared in accordance with the special provisions of Part 15 of the Companies Act 2006 relating to small companies.

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1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' applicable in the UK and Republicable i

Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s).

The accounts have been prepared on a going concern basis as no material uncertainties exist.

Income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the items have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Income from government and other grants, whether capital or revenue, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the funds have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably and is not deferred.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are included at cost less depreciation and impairment. Depreciation has been calculated to write off the of the tangible fixed assets over their expected useful lives as follows:

10 years - improvements to property

3 years - computers

5 years - other plant and machinery

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds of the charity which the trustees have decided at their descretion to set aside to use for a specific purpose.

Restricted funds are to be solely used for particular projects being undertaken by the charity.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

Donated goods

Donated goods are recognised as income when the charity has control over the item, any conditions associated with the transfer have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use by the charity of the item is probable and that economic benefit can be measure reliably. Donated goods are recognised on the basis of the value of the donation to the charity which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay on the open market.

In accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) the general volunteer time is not recognised.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Current assets and liabilities

Debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid.

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments.

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount.
