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TRUSTEES REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2019

The Trustees present their report and financial statements for the year ended 31 August 2019.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the Charitable Incorporated Organisation's governing document, the Charities Act 2011 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016)

Objectives and activities

The Charitable Incorporated Organisation's objects are to advance such charitable purposes (according to the law of England and Wales) as the Trustees see fit from time in particular but not limited to the advancing of the education of young people for the public benefit, by making grants and awards, in particular but not exclusively to (i) individual young persons; (ii) educational organisations and projects for young people; (iii) community development organisations and projects which aim to further the education of, support and inspire young people; (iv) arts and sciences organisations and projects which aim to further the education of, support and inspire young people.

The Trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the Charitable Incorporated Organisation should undertake.

The trustees make grant payments against specific criteria set out by the trustees in accordance with the Charity's objectives.

Achievements and performance

The charities main achievements in the year, has been The Female Lead project.

The Female Lead is dedicated to making women's stories more visible and offering alternative role models to those ever-present in popular culture. Founded by data pioneer and entrepreneur Edwina Dunn, the project highlights the breadth of female achievement in order to offer inspiration for future generations.

It creates a variety of spaces to present these stories including the Women Who Shape Our World book (and associated videos), an online and social media presence, and an outreach programme for girls in schools, celebrating female role models who shape the world.

The 5 key messages we want to share are

- DARE TO BE DIFFERENT
- ASK FOR HELP
- FIND STRENGTH IN SETBACKS
- STAY CURIOUS
- FEED YOUR PASSIONS

Over the course of the year, The Female Lead has continued to donate copies of the Women who Shape Our World book free to schools across the UK and the US. In October 2019 a major new piece of social media research was launched by The Female Lead. The study was a joint research venture with Psychologist Dr Terri Apter. The study ("Disrupting the Feed") was a year-long qualitative study in five schools across the UK to explore whether altering the variety and composition of who teen girls follow on social media can positively impact their mental health and their personal aspirations. The study revealed that there were multiple positive outcomes that resulted from the introduction of new, diverse and positive female role models into the social media feed of girls between the ages of 14 - 18.

TRUSTEES REPORT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2019

The study concluded that: A causal relationship exists between following positive female role models on social media and having higher and more focused personal and career aspirations. Offering teens alternative females to follow 'disrupted' the homogeneity of what the teens engaged with via social channels thereby focusing them on more inspirational content, related to their personal interests and ambitions. This also resulted in positive action in terms of their passions and aspirations in the offline world. Introducing positive female role models into teen girls 'follow' lists prompted more positive interactions with social media overall. Participants chose to alter their social media habits for better mental health including taking planned 'breaks' from social media or re-thinking who they followed to remove anyone who they recognised as having a negative impact on their self-esteem

The Female Lead Society was also launched in September 2019 - this is a free service offered to UK schools where students design and run a leadership programme. They can choose from key modules, such as the portrayal of women in media, gender equality, women in science, and building resilience.

Financial review

During the year, the CIO had total incoming resources of £120,310 and made donations of £20,000 in furtherance of the CIO's objectives.

It is the policy of the Charitable Incorporated Organisation that unrestricted funds which have not been designated for a specific use should be maintained at a level equivalent to between three and six month's expenditure. The Trustees consider that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the Charitable Incorporated Organisation's current activities while consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised. This level of reserves has been maintained throughout the year.

Structure, governance and management

The Charitable Incorporated Organisation is controlled by its governing document, a deed of of trust, and constitutes a Charitable Incorporated Organisation.

 - (a) a copy of the proposed resolution has been sent, at or as near as reasonably practicable to the same time, to all of the charity trustees; and
 - (b) the majority of all of the charity trustees has signified agreement to the resolution in a document or documents which has or have been authenticated by their signature, by a statement of their identity accompanying the document or documents, or in such other manner as the charity trustees have previously resolved, and delivered to the CIO at its principal office or such other place as the trustees may resolve

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2019

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

The Edwina Dunn and Clive Humby Educational Foundation is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO).

1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charitable Incorporated Organisation's governing document, the Charities Act 2011 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016). The Charitable Incorporated Organisation is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The Charitable Incorporated Organisation has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities applying FRS 102 Update Bulletin 1 not to prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the Charitable Incorporated Organisation. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, modified to include the revaluation of freehold properties and to include investment properties and certain financial instruments at fair value. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the Charitable Incorporated Organisation has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the Trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives unless the funds have been designated for other purposes.

1.4 Incoming resources

Income is recognised when the Charitable Incorporated Organisation is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the Charitable Incorporated Organisation has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Turnover is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and represents amounts receivable for goods and services provided in the normal course of business, net of discounts, VAT and other sales related taxes.

1.5 Resources expended

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

1.6 Foreign exchange

Transactions in currencies other than pounds sterling are recorded at the rates of exchange prevailing at the dates of the transactions. At each reporting end date, monetary assets and liabilities that are denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates prevailing on the reporting end date. Gains and losses arising on translation are included in net income/(expenditure for the period.
