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Report of the Trustees for the Year Ending 31 March 2019

The trustees who are the only members of the charity, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2019. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

Purpose of the Charity:

Europia is the only registered Charity to support E.U citizens in Greater Manchester. Since our first meeting in December 2008 we have focused on having clearer objectives. This includes our vision "to promote social inclusion for the public benefit by preventing E.U Expats from becoming socially excluded, relieving the needs of those people who are socially excluded and assisting them to integrate into society".

Structure, governance and management

Governing document:

The charity is controlled by its CIO governing document: constitution. A CIO is a corporate body (like a company) that can own property, employ staff and enter into other contracts in its own name (rather than in the names of the trustees). Our registration number in England and Wales is 1161453.

Trustee selection:

The Trustee board is derived from the larger community, including friends and supporters of Europia.

The board seeks to reflect this diversity through its profile and enable its members to champion those communities. Currently the board has representatives from the Eastern European communities working in various business settings. They each enrich the board with their skills, local knowledge and experience. We also have client representatives on our trustee board who provide valuable insights on how we should shape our future vision in a client friendly manner.

There is a robust trustee application process with a clear audit trail.

Activities for Achieving Objectives

Europia Support:

a) Welfare Advice and Legal surgery:

From April 2018 to March 2019 we scheduled 45 face to face appointments from both WAS and LS sessions. These clients were from Poland, Latvia, Czech Republic and Romania. I estimate that approximately 75% of the clients who attended these sessions were Polish and 75% were female.

Universal Credit was introduced in stages throughout the United Kingdom from 2013 to 2017. Universal Credit replaced Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance, Income-related Employment and Support Allowance, Income Support, Working Tax Credit, Child Tax Credit, and Housing Benefit. Clients in receipt of the legacy benefits were contacted by the DWP and made to switch to Universal Credit. Understandably this resulted in a lot of confusion amongst our clients. We were there to provide an overview of the new scheme and assist clients with their online UC claims. UC pays out on a monthly basis as opposed to weekly or biweekly. This alone has resulted in hardships amongst our clients and additionally clients have fallen into arrears with their rent as a result of delays in payment of UC. Aside from UC we have assisted clients with PIP, carers allowance, and child benefit applications to name a few.

In the second quarter of 2018 we observed that a large proportion of the clients who attended our Legal Surgery were in need of family law support. Divorce, child maintenance and custody of children after divorce were common queries. We also assisted a client with a case of child abduction, a father had taken a child to an Arab country without the mother's consent. Our highly capable pro bono solicitor Marta Grzelak was able to advise clients accordingly.

b) Brexit Information Sessions:

As March 2019 was just around the corner, and the UK Government seem to be a long way off from making a deal with the EU on exiting the European Union, it is vital that EU citizens living in the UK have up to date information on their rights as residents living in the UK.

We understand there are many questions and clarifications relating to the settled status and rights of E.U citizens living in the U.K. Europia and delivered eight information sessions in various different languages along with our legal partners in Manchester, Oldham and Bolton between January to March 2019. We believe it is vital that EU citizens are kept up to date with all relevant updates about negotiations and what the negotiations mean for them.

Europia hopes the information sessions will assist EU citizens in the UK in understanding what Brexit means for them, what their rights are and help to inform them to assist them making decisions about their next steps.

Europia partnered with the European Commission and Law Centres Network to deliver 7 information sessions across greater Manchester in various different European languages. We also helped this national program by providing feedback form translations in different languages. We reached over 80 people during these sessions and they were from Poland, Czech Republic, Latvia, Lithuania, Spain, Nigeria, the Netherlands, Slovakia, Italy and Germany.

Europia Art Collective (EARTS)





In April 2018 we started the EARTS Collective with 5 monthly Ideas Exchange meetings inviting European expat artists based in Manchester for a discussion. The meetings were open to anyone to attend and through these gatherings we collected data and information on whether such collectives were necessary for local expat artists, what kind of struggles they face while integrating into the UK's creative scene and what support they would like to have.

Some of the consistent themes of this discussion was the lack of artistic recognition and social circles as well as information or knowledge to support any new artistic endeavours. Thinking of this Collective as a hub of information exchange as well as support from other artists, we have decided that such friendly, supportive, and welcoming space would benefit local European expat artists - encourage their artistic development and integration to local culture.

As a result we have created:

- * Branded Social Media platforms (Facebook, Twitter, Instagram)
- * Sign Up structure & forms for new members

At the end of the Planning Stage, we had a committed 8 member core group that has formed over time: Karol Kochanowski (Poland), Amalia Serban (Romania), Ivona Torovin (Poland/Lithuania), Katarzyna Jablonska (Poland), Baiba Auria (Latvia) Mateusz Beznic (Poland), Ruta Skudraite (Lithuania), and Kush Chottera (Executive Director of Europia).

Europia Health and Wellbeing:

i) Community Language Support Sessions

We have been working in Lower Kersal in Salford for the past two years. We were brought in by Salford City Council to manage the unrest and tensions between the Romanian (Roma Gypsy) population and the long-term residents of 5 specific streets. There have been Hate Crime residents, fly tipping and general concerns of how people live in this area. We organised community events, community trips in Salford and language classes and advice sessions to help boost the confidence and wellbeing of Salford residents.



ii) Ambition for ageing research:

Europia became the first organisation to conduct research on the needs of over 50 Polish nationals in Greater Manchester. We are pleased that the very capable Dr Hanna Wadle executed the research and wrote a very detailed in-depth report. View a synopsis of the report on the link below –

With funding from Manchester Sprit we conducted a series of walks across Manchester. We organised a session for over 50 Polish nationals and also for the Lithuanian community along with the LGBT community. Public Benefit

The Trustees have had regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit and have acted in the public benefit as outlined in the activities reported in the preceding section.

Going Concern

The trustees have reviewed cash flow forecasts and with additional income and an informal repayment plan is in place to repay the loans at £100/month. The trustees have considered the current and future activities of the charity and known levels of income and expenditure and are satisfied that the charity is a going concern.

Financial Review

In the year to 31 March 2019, total income was £27,979. Expenditure was £31,384, resulting in a deficit of £3,405. The charity continues to operate through its existing bank facilities and the fact that loans are not immediately repayable with an informal repayment plan in place. A prior period adjustment was required on the 2018 comparatives as expenditure and liabilities were understated by £6,270 in the previously submitted 2018 financial statements.

Reserves Policy

The charity does not currently have a formal reserves policy. It is in the process of formulating one and once the policy is approved, the Trustees will seek to achieve this target level in future reporting periods. As at 31 March 2019, the charity had total funds of a deficit of £7,908 (2018: deficit of £4,503). There were no fixed assets, no restricted or designated funds meaning this value represents free reserves.

Future Plans

We plan to expand our services into providing EUSS support and take a more strategic approach in funding our Europia Support project. We also plan to seek funding for EARTS to ensure it's financially sustainable.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2019

Accounting Policies

1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Europia meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

Europia constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

1.2 Reconciliation with previous Generally Accepted Accounting Practice

In preparing these accounts, the Trustees have considered whether in applying the accounting policies required by FRS 102 and the Charities SORP FRS 102 the restatement of comparative items was required.

1.3 Going concern

The trustees have reviewed cash flow forecasts and with additional income and an informal repayment plan is in place to repay the loans at £100/month. The trustees have considered the current and future activities of the charity, cash balances and known levels of income and expenditure and are satisfied that the charity is a going concern.

1. Accounting Policies (continued)

1.4 Income

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

For legacies, entitlement is taken as the earlier of the date on which either: the charity is aware that probate has been granted, the estate has been finalised and notification has been made by the executor(s) to the Trust that a distribution will be made, or when a distribution is received from the estate. Receipt of a legacy, in whole or in part, is only considered probable when the amount can be measured reliably and the charity has been notified of the executor's intention to make a distribution. Where legacies have been notified to the charity, or the charity is aware of the granting of probate, and the criteria for income recognition have not been met, then the legacy is treated as a contingent asset and disclosed if material.

Donated services or facilities are recognised when the charity has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use of the charity of the item is probable and that economic benefit can be measured reliably. In accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102), the general volunteer time of the Friends is not recognised and refer to the Trustees' report for more information about their contribution.

On receipt, donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised in expenditure in the period of receipt.

Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Income tax recoverable in relation to investment income is recognised at the time the investment income is receivable.

1.5 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

Support costs are those costs incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the charity and include project management carried out at Headquarters.

Costs of generating funds are costs incurred in attracting voluntary income, and those incurred in trading activities that raise funds.

Charitable activities and Governance costs are costs incurred on the charity's operations, including support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities.

1.6 Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the Bank.

1.7 Cash at Bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

1.8 Liabilities and provisions

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the Balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the charity anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the provision is based on the present value of those amounts, discounted at the pre-tax discount rate that reflects the risks specific to the liability. The unwinding of the discount is recognised within interest payable and similar charges.

1.9 Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

1.10 Pensions

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme and the pension charge represents the amounts payable by the charity to the fund in respect of the year.

1.11 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.
