#### TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE PERIOD 3RD JULY 2018 TO 31ST MARCH 2019

#### Introduction

Active Oxfordshire was formed and started activities in September 2018, taking over the operations and activities of Oxfordshire Sport and Physical Activity (OXSPA) which had previously been hosted by Oxford City Council. This followed an extensive transformation process and governance review driven internally with the support of Sport England, the organisation's principal funder.

The new Charity can, over time, look to access a wider variety of local and national funding streams but in the first phase of the new organisation's development there has been a focus on ensuring that the assets and existing contracts of OXSPA were novated to Active Oxfordshire. The assets included an unrestricted reserve of £264,601, which forms the opening balance in the accounts.

Staff who came across to the new organisation have been given new contracts and have agreed a new appraisal and remuneration package designed to motivate and reward high performance in alignment with a new set of core values and operational priorities agreed with the New Board of Trustees.

# **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### Objectives and aims

The objects of the Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) are for the public benefit to promote community participation in sport and healthy recreation for the benefits of the inhabitants of Oxfordshire in particular by:

- working with and through local agencies to increase levels of participation in sport and physical activity;
- promoting and providing programmes and services for sport, recreation, physical activity, information education and other leisure time occupation for healthy recreation;
- promoting and providing facilities and services for recreational, sporting or other leisure time occupation in the interests of social welfare for the public at large or those who by reason of their youth, age, infirmity or disablement, financial hardship or social and economic circumstances, have need of such facilities and services;
- the improvement and preservation of good health and well-being through participation in healthy recreation;
- promoting and providing education, training and coaching courses which promote physical health and fitness;
- facilitating and providing impact evaluation, performance measurement and related intelligence for public benefit in the context of sport, recreation, physical activity and wider health and well-being.

Active Oxfordshire works towards these objectives by building excellent working relationships with strategic partners. Sport England provided 70% of our funding for a variety of interventions and programmes including Satellite Clubs, Workforce, Primary School Sport Premium, Volunteering and School Games which all contribute towards these charitable objectives. Oxfordshire's County Council's Public Health Department have also supported our work through an annual Funding Agreement. Other programmes use physical activity to help the treatment of diabetes patients (Go Active Get Healthy) or to help provide employment and well-being for disabled people (OxForward). More detail of our achievements and performance is given below.

More detail of the income and expenditure is given below, together with detail of income and spend. In addition, information on our work, team and constitution/operation is provided to stakeholders on the new website www.activeoxfordshire.org to help provide transparency and accountability.

### **ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE Our Work with Sport England**

After a period of uncertainty around core Sport England (SE) funding during the transformation process all matters have now been satisfactorily resolved. Active Oxfordshire now has funding certainty through to March 2021 in line with the other Active Partnerships working across England. Active Oxfordshire now has a clearly defined "primary role" agreed with Sport England and that has moved the organisation away from delivery and into the adoption of a more strategic approach which involves new ways of working, new skill sets, clear accountabilities and a whole new approach to collaborative leadership typified by regular external accreditation through the Quest process and an annual Round Table meeting with funders and stakeholders to drive improvement.

Our key area of focus is to develop the narrative around the benefits of physical activity and sport to help shape healthy places and activate communities across Oxfordshire while directly addressing existing health inequalities in the process.

#### **ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE**

In addition, programme funding has now been secured to support our work with Children and Young People and around Workforce Development. This gives the new organisation the time and space to plan forward with partners and stakeholders on how these monies can be targeted to best effect to support our purpose and vision around addressing physical activity levels and health inequalities in the County.

Active Oxfordshire has also achieved Quest accreditation in 2018 for the first time as part of the new Sport England Performance Management and Improvement Framework (PMIF) and we have committed to repeating the external assessment every two years to assess progress, improvement and development against the agreed Service Improvement Plan. Our goal will be to improve our Quest rating from Satisfactory to Excellent over a period of time in order to demonstrate our organisational effectiveness and help evidence our value and impact.

Collaborative working with the Active Partnerships in neighbouring Buckinghamshire and Berkshire (LEAP and Get Berkshire Active) has also led to a successful workforce innovation bid which will kick off in September 2019, while a solicited application to roll out Healthy Place Shaping across the County has been agreed in principle by Sport England and will generate £925,000 of new investment into the County over a three-year period from September 2019 onwards. This is a big vote of confidence in the new organisation and its direction.

#### **Continuous Improvement**

The external Quest assessment provides rigour now against a nationally agreed set of standards and outputs. Plans are in place to augment this with a more rigorous approach to measuring both staff and partner engagement/satisfaction to help drive improvement. Work has commenced on creating a Balanced Scorecard of KPIs that will provide the newly re-constituted Strategy and Nominations Sub Committee (SNSC) with clear success criteria against which the organisation's performance and improvement can be assessed.

### Strategic Networking

All 43 Active Partnerships have a key role in developing strategic networks across their areas, working collaboratively in support of agreed common goals. Active Oxfordshire's purpose has been re-defined to focus on tackling physical inactivity and addressing health inequalities. In this period Active Oxfordshire has produced a Position Statement and Operational Plan to ensure we define our role and remit with care in conjunction with key stakeholders. Active Oxfordshire has also brokered a Leadership Forum of key influencers and decision makers in the County and this now meets regularly to share information, promote best practice and provide a networking opportunity. There is a focus on re-establishing positive working relationships with local authorities while taking full advantage of the funding links in place with the County Council Public Health team and the Oxfordshire Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) so that Active Oxfordshire works shoulder to shoulder on the emerging prevention agenda.

# Workforce

Active Oxfordshire maintains strong links with the established sports sector and local clubs but increasingly the organisation has been working more pro-actively to build a stronger wider network of partners in different sectors to embrace the benefits of physical activity with reference to target communities and the healthcare workforce (including social prescribers) who can reach and engage under-represented and inactive groups. There is also the need to develop better apprenticeship routes and find ways to develop a more diverse volunteer and coaching workforce. This will be the focus of future work.

#### **School Games**

Active Oxfordshire and our local School Games Networks continue to be recognised by Sport England and Youth Sport Trust at a national level for high quality festivals and events. The School Games in Oxfordshire is based on a desire to widen access to sport and physical activity across the County with more focus now on target schools identified in collaboration with Public Health. The School Games provided:

- Over 30,000 young people involved in county events 55% Girls/Young Women, 13% BAME and 16% Special Educational Needs.
- $\circ$  23 sports including several inclusive formats and targeted competitions opening the games up to a wider range of young people.
- o More than 350 young leaders and officials involved in Level 3 Events and 3000 in all, across all activities.

#### **ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE**

#### **Satellite Clubs**

Active Oxfordshire is working hard now to develop new thinking and delivery models around this funding, so it is more targeted and responsive to local needs and requirements building on some innovative practice developed in this period when we have:

- o Funded and delivered 12 new projects
- o 200 newly engaged participants 74% female; 15% disabled and 32% BAME
- o 42% of interventions were located in top 20% Index of Multiple Deprivation (IMD) areas

#### Primary School Sports Premium (PSSP)

Active Oxfordshire has a mandated role from the Department of Culture, Media and Sport (DCMS) to support primary schools to effectively utilise their Government funding for Physical Education and sport (the PSSP). Active Oxfordshire is also continuing to record how schools are allocating their funding to support work on a local and national level as well as producing case studies of good practice to showcase to schools. More links have now been made with the new Active Lives Young People Survey to illustrate the "ticking time bomb" of low levels of physical activity in our children and this will be the focus of our work over the coming year.

#### **Safeguarding**

Active Oxfordshire is committed to ensuring that the safeguarding and protection of young people is at the heart of all we do. As part of our commitment to safeguarding young people, Active Oxfordshire has already:

- o Reviewed and amended the annual Safeguarding Implementation plan to address vulnerable adults.
- o Supported and delivered Safeguarding training for local coaches and volunteers
- o Maintained a Green RAG rating following an annual external review with the Child Protection in Sport Unit.
- Updated the new Active Oxfordshire website to ensure relevant information is available for our partners and local deliverers.

#### **Disability Sport**

Active Oxfordshire's focus is to provide inclusive activities wherever possible through funded programmes and local networking/partnership working. There is a close working relationship with Activity Alliance with plans to consult on a self-assessment exercise to ensure the organisation promotes and practices integration.

#### **Local Programmes and Commissions**

<u>-OxForward</u>: This project was terminated in January 2019 when Oxfordshire County Council terminated the commission awarded to Kennedy Scott to provide employment and well-being services to disabled people in the County. Active Oxfordshire's work was highly regarded and new ways to reach this target audience will be explored.

-Go Active Get Healthy: This project, which was focused on the treatment of people with diabetes, was completely restructured in its second year of operation with local authorities who now provide most of the delivery capacity. Results showed continued improvement in service delivery across the districts and resulted in exceeding the targets by the end of the funding round. In March, the CCG agreed to sustain the intervention for another year and to provide some initial investment in pre-diabetes prevention work.

FINANCIAL REVIEW Financial position Results for the year

The results are set out in the Statement of Financial Activities.

The work of Active Oxfordshire had previously been delivered by Oxfordshire Sport and Physical Activity (OxSPA) who were hosted by Oxford City Council. As part of the novation of activities and assets, an unrestricted reserve of £264,601 was transferred and this forms the opening balance. The restricted balances from OxSPA were transferred into the appropriate project as restricted income.

On this basis, incoming resources for the period were £462,009, while resources expended were £438,349 so the overall surplus for the period was £23,660. However, within this, £70,813 of restricted funds are being held for the next fiscal year, so there is an underlying unrestricted overspend of £47,153 for the period. This was due to planned investments in governance, start-up and transfer costs and leaves a balance of £217,448 in unrestricted reserves at 31 March 2019.

The reserve balances carried forward at 31 March 2019 were £70,813 restricted funds and unrestricted funds of £217,448.

#### Reserves policy

The charity will set aside a sum by way of a reserve against unforeseen contingencies. This sum will be used in the event of the organisation being threatened with closure, for redundancy payments, to cover long term sickness liabilities and maternity pay.

This reserve is calculated annually to cover essential expenditure for three months plus redundancy payments for budgeted staff members.

#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a constitution, and constitutes a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO), as defined by the Charities Act 2011.

Following extensive work as part of the transformation process Active Oxfordshire is fully compliant with Tier 3 of the Sport England Code of Governance. A full Governance Statement using guidance provided by Sport England is on the Active Oxfordshire website www.activeoxfordshire.org/governance and work in this area is overseen by the newly restructured Finance, Risk, Remuneration, Audit and Governance Sub Committee (FRRAG).

#### **Board of Trustees**

Now that the organisation is an independent Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) it will be vital to develop the capacity and capability of the Board of Trustees to move the organisation forward. A Board Succession Plan has been agreed and signed off by the Board following an internal review. This will help the organisation build up a skills-based approach as well as supporting greater diversity as the charity seeks to reflect the community it serves. A decision to link up with Oxford Hub's Young Trustee Programme is a very positive development pathway for the future.

Active Oxfordshire continues to work with Sport England and the Active Partnership Network to adopt best recruitment practices in compliance with latest guidance on Governance and Board operation. This involves open advertisements; collaborative working with appointed consultants appointed by Sport England as well as programmed internal/external audits and reviews.

### **COMMENCEMENT OF ACTIVITIES**

This charity was incorporated as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) on 3rd July 2018 and commenced activities on the same date.

### **AUDITORS**

The auditors, Richardson Jones, will be proposed for re-appointment at the forthcoming Annual General Meeting.

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

# Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

#### **Income**

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

#### **Expenditure**

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

#### **Taxation**

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

#### **Fund accounting**

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

# Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
